FOR a while it looked like Clooney-Quin were going to make a game of it. Ballyvaughan had surged five points clear with eight minutes left in the first half. But their opponents hung on and reeled of three points to close the gap at half time to 0-7 0-5. And then Ballyvaughan stepped it up a gear. The goal, they came desperately close to scoring in the first half, finally arrived four minutes into the second.

The busy Stephen Hynes fed Cian Walsh who finished high to the net from a tight angle on the left.

Ballyvaughan led by five and set about ruthlessly extending that lead. They ended the day with a more than respectable total of 1-15. Thirteen of their sixteen scores came from play. A slick exhibition of forward play.

In John Martin and Phelim Kyne, Ballyvaughan had the sort of corner forwards corner backs hate to see coming. All pace, sharp turns and an eye for the score.

Stephen Hynes processed an amount of ball at centre forward while back among the defensive lines Sean Mc-Namara was full of running.

The game could have been over long before Walsh fired to the net. Four times in the first half, Ballyvaughan fluffed their lines in front of goal, denied by a couple of brave saves from Clooney-Quin goalkeeper Ronan Gallagher.

Starting with a formidable midfield pairing of Cathal Egan and Fergal Lynch, Clooney-Quin made an encouraging start.

Johnny O'Brien slotted over a free and this was followed up by a point from Pat Gardiner.

The first of Ballyvaughan's goal chances arrived in the 10th minute when Martin blasted over from close range.

It set the North Clare side on their way. Points from Phelim Kyne, Jack

Queally and again from Kyne pushed them three points clear.

In between Gallagher kept out efforts from Ballyvaughan captain Mark O'Loughlin and Jack Queally. Martin converted a free before Clooney Quin steadied. Declan O'Keefe received some good ball at full forward and made it count.

The former Kerry goalkeeper kicked two points and Johnny O'Brien one to leave just two points between the sides at half time.

Ballyvaughan responded quickly to another O'Brien point with Walsh's goal in the 34th minute. After they just kept the scoreboard ticking over. Martin, Adrian Fleming and Stephen Hynes scored in quick succession to stretch Ballyvaughan's lead to seven points.

Totally dominant, Ballyvaughan kept heaping on the points with substitute Jason McDonagh slotting over seconds after making his entrance. O'Keeffe pointed a free for just Clooney-Quin's second point of the half in the final seconds.
